CIFTED & TALENTED


BEBRAS CHALLENGE

Some of our classes competed in groups and other individually. The Year 7s all competed individually with one student receiving a perfect score! Well done to Tim Overkov.



















ACADEMIC EXTENSION

I joined Willetton SHS at the beginning of this Term 2 and even though I haven't been here long, the warm welcome from students and staff has made me feel right at home. I am originally from Southeast London in the United Kingdom, where I completed art college and my BA(Hons) degree.

I then went on to have a successful, albeit unrelated, career in pharmaceuticals until I had the amazing opportunity to emigrate to Australia in 2008, this being the catalyst to pursue a full-time art career. Upon arrival in Australia, I travelled for several months exploring the distance from Sydney to Perth via the Northern Territory. On this journey I travelled through the Kimberley region, and I knew we would be back. One of my first jobs was at Mangkaja Arts Centre in Fitzroy Crossing, a remote Aboriginal community in the Kimberley region. I lived and worked there for four years, and it was an incredible learning experience both creatively and culturally.

Now, I live in the Perth Hills, where my studio is my creative hub. As well as my role at Willetton Senior High School, I am an abstract artist, muralist, and artist mentor. I run workshops for people of all abilities, both in-person across WA and online. I love helping others discover their artistic potential.

I also work with professional artists by providing business development sessions through art centres. For seven years, I owned a gallery space in Guildford, which I closed in January 2024 to focus on my personal art practice. I spend time in my studio creating for galleries and clients, working on art residencies, and designing/creating large scale public art murals.

I am passionate about championing the importance of art and creativity in everyday lives which is why I enjoy working in educational settings like WSHS.

It gives students a chance to be historians, researching world history, examining Australia's past, investigating their community, or exploring their own roots. It emphasises and rewards quality research, the use of community resources and effective presentation.

Students in some classes in Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 in Humanities and Social Sciences have started the National History Challenge as a Class Assessment. This year's theme is *crisis and response*.



The competition involves students producing a piece of work that responded to the theme of *crisis and response*. Those students selected as finalists will have demonstrated research and referencing skills. They will through their research prove the significance of the topic chosen, be historically correct and have addressed the theme.

Students in the participating classes compete for a place in the National History Challenge. Only 6 entries can be selected from each cohort to enter the competition. We have received a wide range of entries covering many subjects and are looking forward to awesome entries being submitted for judging.



The assistenti enrich our students' learning experiences by providing authentic language practice and unique insights into Italian culture.

These young adults are hosted by families whose children attend Willetton SHS. This term we would like to extend our gratitude to the YOST and GUMPY/ GILMAN families for their generous hospitality in welcoming Teresa and Lorenzo into their homes. Teresa and Lorenzo have been with us since the beginning of Term 2 and have proven invaluable in contributing their expertise and enthusiasm to our Italian language program.

TERESA TADROS

My name is Teresa Tadros, I am 23 years old, and I'm from Milan, Italy. I came to Australia through the WAATI Assistenti Program, in conjunction with the Catholic University of Milan where I graduated from languages.

My role within the school is to help the teachers in the classroom in any way indicated by the classroom teachers, such as engaging in oral work (one-on-one, pair, or group work), correcting and providing feedback on students' work, or finding online resources.

By working at Willetton Senior High School, I instantly realised that the education system here in Australia operates differently than the one in Italy.

Here in Perth, I am being hosted by a family that I want to thank for having me, for being so nice and generous with me, and for making me feel part of the family. Being with an Australian family has helped me live the experience to the fullest, see and do what locals really do in their everyday lives, and has also helped improve my English.

I also want to thank the school and all the teachers I have worked with for always being so nice and welcoming.

My name is Lorenzo Sette. I am 22 years old, and I'm from L'Aquila, Italy, but I'm studying in Milan. I came to Australia through the WAATI Assistenti Program, in conjunction with the Catholic University of Milan, where I'm pursuing a Master's degree in Marketing and Communication.

My role within the school is to help the teachers in the classroom in any way indicated by them, such as engaging in oral work (one-on-one, pair, or group work), correcting and providing feedback on students' work, or finding online resources.

ITALIAN STUDY TOUR

With excited smiles and nervous laughs, we set off from Perth Airport on 11 December 2023, ready for our three-week Study Tour around beautiful Italy. Prof. Pia Palermo and Prof. Melissa llett accompanied us on the unforgettable experience.



After a stopover in Doha, Qatar, we arrived at the capital of Italy, Rome.

We were bright-eyed and bushy-tailed despite the long-haul flight to the other side of the world. We didn't miss a beat, and on the very next day, our tour guide taught us the history of both the legendary Colosseum and the marvelous Roman Forum. We also saw the remains of Circus Maximus (a large ancient chariot-racing stadium).

The next day was even busier, as we navigated Rome on foot to see the Vatican Museum, Saint Peter's Basilica, the Trevi Fountain, the Pantheon, Piazza Navona and the Spanish Steps.



Then, we flew to Sicily (an island south of Italy). First, we had lunch at Mt. Etna and enjoyed the breathtaking views and some of us enjoyed snow for the very first time.



By nightfall, we arrived at Taormina, a beautiful tranquil town in Sicily. There, we walked along quaint streets and received tasters of artisan chocolate and biscuits, visited the Greek Amphitheatre, and had a cooking class where we handmade pasta and decorated cannoli.





We also visited the nearby cities of Ortygia and Noto, and were grateful to Graziano, our kind bus driver who would amaze us with his singing as well. In these nearby cities, we bought scarves and souvenirs from bancarelle (stalls) and explored chiese (churches). We then boarded a ferry to return to mainland Italy, and then caught a train to go to Naples.



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From Naples, we travelled to Pompeii to see the Vesuvius Volcano and the ruins. Our tour guide taught us about how life could have been before the major eruption that swallowed the city.

It was finally time for us to head to Casoli, in the region of Abruzzo. There, many of us had host families, however, all of us still got the chance to experience Italian high school life, at the Istituto d'Istruzione Superiore Statale Algeri Marino (Algiers Marine State Higher Education Institute). The Italian teachers also took us on field trips, we were amazed by the many similarities and differences evident between Australia and Italy.





For those of us who were being hosted by an Italian family, we learnt so many Italian traditions and customs! Many of us were amazed by the humongous lunches and dinners that happen every day, but especially on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. The days in Casoli flew by so quickly, and it was so sad to leave our host Italian families!



In our final week, we went back up North to visit some of the most renowned cities in Italy: Florence, Pisa, Venice and Milan! We visited the *Galleria degli Uffizi* (the Uffizi Gallery) in Florence, taking a leap through time to appreciate Italy's artistic heritage. We saw Botticelli's Renaissance paintings, *La Nascita di Venere* (The Birth of Venus), and *La Primavera* (Spring) in the flesh.

Since we were in the area, we had to visit the Leaning Tower of Pisa. We climbed 296 steps through the narrow, windy tower till we reached the top! All that work was worth it once we saw the breathtaking view from the top, overseeing the entire city.





Even though our holiday was filled with travelling, we were continuously learning; we were enrolled to learn Italian at an actual language school.

Venice was quite busy late
December, but we were lucky to
score a ride in the gondolas! A
kind gondolier offered to take our
group for a spin around Venice
even after his usual working hours.
We saw the Casino di Venezia, the
first ever casino built which was
featured in the Bond movies!

Another iconic site we visited was the Doge's Palace! Here, we got a crash course on its history and its infamous inhabitants. In particular, Giocamo Casanova, a renowned author, spy and priest. We visited his cell and learned about his daring escape from prison by walking out the front gate!

For the final time, we enjoyed pizza on New Year's Eve in Milan. We spent New Year's Eve continents away from family but with each other and pizza for company, we had a blast! Throughout the entire trip, we enjoyed the Italian cuisine and were delighted to taste the famous tiramisu. Many of us also bought gelatos and chocolates from the Italian choco-gelateria Venchi in the various fashion boutiques, we stopped at.





Our return was bittersweet, we were both excited to see our families, yet aware that we would no longer wake up to majestic architecture or breathtaking views of natural landscapes. However, we came back and recharged. We now study Italian with even more gusto, as we reminisce our memories from Italy.

MATHS

FIND SOMEONE WHO ACTIVITY

SCIENCE

ALL IN A DAY'S WORK

Most teachers have just spent the last fortnight marking a large number of exam papers. On average, each upper school science teacher has spent 35hrs marking their students' Semester 1 exams. In parallel with this busy period, teachers continue to deliver high quality lessons.

The Year 8s were shown the properties of dry ice. Mr Boughton's class was particularly impressed with the effectiveness of Mr Boughton's Banana Hammer – at 80 degrees celcius, it was very cool!

Dr Fisher and Mr Boughton teamed up to demonstrate the physics of transforming electricity from 240V to lower voltages to Dr Fisher's Year 12 Physics Class.

The students were impressed by Mr Boughton's improvised *rail gun* – an aluminum ring which was launched from bench to ceiling. With so many renewable energy projects being built around the world, Willetton's physics students have a bright future.



BIODIVERSITY AND NOONGAR CULTURE EXCURSION

The Year 9 Gifted and Talented students went on a *Biodiversity and Noongar Culture* excursion to Murdoch University as part of their Ecology unit. The students planted some plants to revegetate the Chelodonia Wetlands, did a plant id scavenger hunt, a survey, and learnt about the importance of our local West Australian plants in Noongar culture, and the importance of preserving the bush to provide habitat for native animals.

Our Year 9 cohort have had several opportunities to explore various careers this year, including a trip to the Automotive Workshops at Carlisle TAFE and a visit to the school from their lecturer to share educational and vocational options for students beyond school. There will be more of these opportunities throughout the year. Read on for the experience of one of our students who visited the TAFE campus.

THE CAREER CURIOUS AUTOMOTIVE TASTER

My peers and I were thrilled to be accepted into The Career Curious Automotive Taster. It was an honour. We weren't told what would happen, but the thought of mystery activities piqued everyone's interest. The sound of massive drills and engines welcomed us, along with a charming woman, named Natalie, who served as our host and guide.

Our host greeted us at the session and reviewed the first things she would cover. The first item we covered was selecting a career. She disclosed to us that, despite having held multiple professions and a different college degree, she continued to perform her duties as a Career Taster Lecturer. She said that she enjoyed giving speeches in front of an audience and advised us to pick a profession that would allow us to be adaptable and engaging.

She assigned us a variety of enjoyable activities to do during the day after her talk. During our tour of the Carlisle TAFE campus, Natalie showed us the many sections and grounds dedicated to automotive studies. She also highlighted to us the various

professions and responsibilities that are associated with each field in the automotive business. A few of the things we tried were attaching wires and circuitry to lemons and testing their voltage. We also tried joining all the lemons together to count the total voltage and to see if we could start a car, but we were unable to do so. To start a car, 66 million lemons are required. Natalie also showed us how to use a virtual reality headset to explore careers we might select in the future in a game style, including chef, artist, astronaut, heart surgeon, and demolition worker. To put it mildly, it was quite hilarious despite being really confusing. We were told to remain seated to prevent any mishaps.



We were encouraged to modify the activities to suit our comfort level if we didn't fit them, and we experienced a variety of motivating experiences that helped us figure out what we wanted to accomplish in the future while we were on campus. Erin has taught and informed us ways to protect ourselves to make sure we stay safe.


YEAR 9 RIVER CRUISE
